The **California Subject Matter Project (CSMP)** is a network of nine discipline-based projects that provide professional learning designed by K–12 and university educators, to improve student learning and literacy.

Located across 90 regional sites throughout California, CSMP creates communities of practice that promote teaching, leadership and equity. Educators acquire tools to improve and enrich their teaching across subject areas. All CSMP resources for professional learning are aligned with California's K–12 Standards and Frameworks, to help students enter and thrive in college and career.

Features

CSMP is an asset to California's education system, providing a professional learning infrastructure that builds lasting alliances between universities, teachers, schools and districts.

- CSMP combines subject-specific content with innovative teaching methods and research-based practices.
- Our school-university partnerships allow K–12 teachers and university faculty to teach and learn in collaboration. This brings together the latest scholarship and K–12 classroom experience to improve students' learning.
- Teachers participating in CSMP programs gain new leadership skills, learn to access and use cutting-edge resources, and join a supportive professional community that outlasts their time in the program.

History and Governance

Founded in 1988, the CSMP network was modeled on UC Berkeley's acclaimed Bay Area Writing Project. CSMP has offered educators a variety of professional learning opportunities designed by teachers and university faculty working together to improve learning. CSMP sites throughout California partner with local schools to create programs that are customized to meet the needs of teachers and students.

CSMP is administered by the University of California Office of the President in concurrence with the California Department of Education, State Board of Education, California State University, California Community Colleges, Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities, Governor's Office, Commission on Teacher Credentialing, and the Instructional Quality Commission. Each project has a statewide office, regional sites and an advisory board comprising representatives from these organizations as well as professional associations and industries.

1,892 professional learning programs were provided by CSMP






Educators consistently rate CSMP's professional learning offerings above others.

■ The California Arts Project (TCAP)

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Arts education develops artistically literate students who are capable of multiple forms of creative communication and perception. These capacities prepare them for college, career and life. TCAP's programs and leadership communities provide professional learning that is aligned with the California Arts Standards and advocate for an equitable, comprehensive arts education for all students.

■ California Global Education Project (CGEP)

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Globally competent students have the knowledge and dispositions to understand and act on issues of global significance. They investigate the world within and beyond their local environment, recognize others' and their own perspectives, communicate ideas effectively with diverse audiences, and take action to improve circumstances. CGEP provides professional learning experiences and support for K–12 educators so they can develop the knowledge, skills, resources and leadership to foster global competence in all students.

■ California History-Social Science Project (CHSSP)

■ California Physical Education-Health Project (CPE-HP)

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When students possess the skills, knowledge and dispositions to shape their own health, they can realize their academic and career goals. CPE-HP provides learning experiences for K–12 teachers in physical and health education. These experiences advance teachers' content knowledge and inspire new decisions for assessment, instruction and creating responsive learning environments.

■ California Reading & Literature Project (CRLP)

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Teachers of reading, language and literacy across content areas have a special role in ensuring that all K–12 students become literate individuals who are equipped for success in college, career and civic life. CRLP provides professional learning in literacy and language instruction aligned with the California standards and ELA/ELD Framework. CRLP's programs combine research and theory with classroom application, an approach that bolsters teachers' practice and leadership development.

■ California Science Project (CSP)

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The CSP offers research-based professional learning for educators that is created by educators, scientists and engineers. Participants can improve their content knowledge and instructional practices to engage all students in the subject matter, in alignment with California's Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) and Frameworks. CWLP programs use research-based teaching practices that affirm the language and cultural assets of California's diverse students.

■ California Writing Project (CWP)
